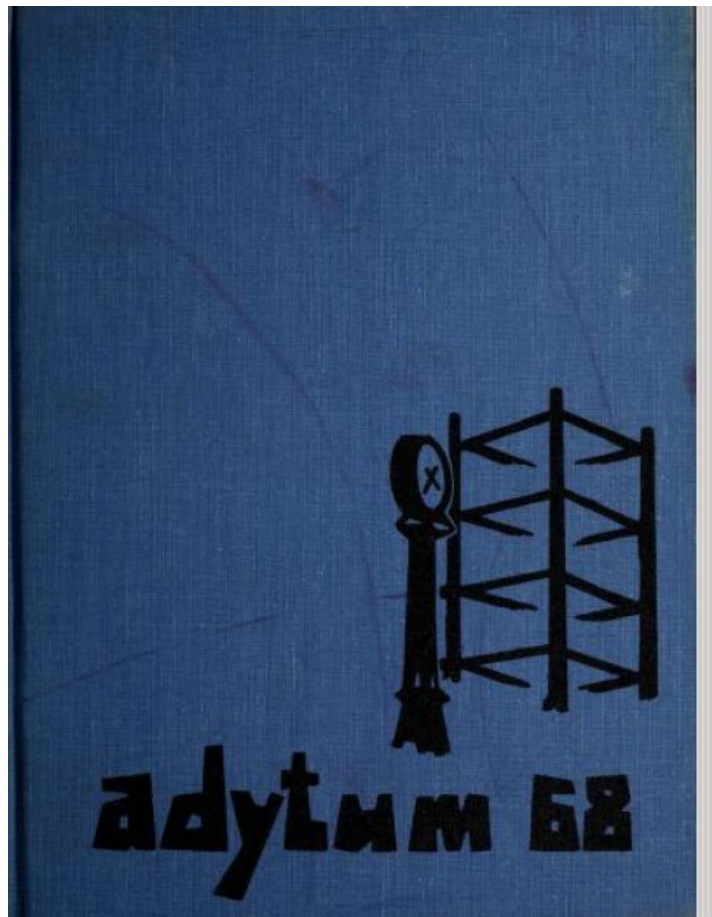

James Wallace Baird, Ph.D. (1946-March 9,2021)



Jim Wallace Baird, was known by all, as Wally and was a lifelong resident of Mt. Lebanon where he graduated from Mt. Lebanon High School in 1964.

At Denison Wally pledged the fraternity of Phi Gamma Delta and majored in psychology. His fraternity brothers found him a good friend with a great sense of humor. He also took his academic studies quite seriously, particularly those in his major.

After Denison he did graduate work at Duquesne University which culminated in a Ph.D. from University of Pittsburgh in 1985. He also served in the U.S. Army Reserve as a military policeman, rated as a sharpshooter.

His professional career as a clinical psychologist included 35 years at Mayview State Hospital in Pittsburgh and 26 years at Associates in Clinical Psychiatry. Wally also served as a Gerontology-Neuropsychological consultant at St. Margaret Hospital. During his career he earned the gratitude of many patients for his compassion, understanding, and wise guidance. His work as a psychologist ended just two weeks before his death.

Wally had an encyclopedic knowledge of matters relating to health and fitness and was the go-to person on the topics of diet, medicine, and exercise. Beginning in 1974, he meditated daily, and his dedication to fitness was legendary. Wally loved to bicycle, logging up to 2,000 miles a year. No route was too difficult. He met each obstacle with strength and grace and relished the challenge and camaraderie that bicycling with friends offered.

During their 49 loving years together, Wally and Harriet enjoyed travel, both together and with friends. The common thread in Wally's life, which ran through his relationships with family, patients and friends, was his unique and genuine concern for others. His obituary ended with, "[Wally] sought to understand our lives, learn our problems as well as our hopes, and offer encouragement. He was rarely critical. The cancer which took him was swift and caught many unawares." He is missed.

Charles Barnes, known to all as Charlie, came to Denison from Cincinnati, Ohio. He became a member of the Sigma Chi Fraternity and played on the varsity baseball team. Charlie majored in economics.

After Denison, Charlie earned a Masters in Business degree at Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois and then went on to work eight years for the Detroit Bank & Trust Company. He was the loan officer in the bank's equipment leasing division, and when he left in 1978, he was president of both of the parent company's leasing operations.

In 1970, Charlie married Christine Hulbert (DU Class of '69) and subsequently had two children. In 1985, Charlie went on to marry his present wife of 32 years, Bunny. In the process he acquired a step-son.

Charlie eventually left the bank and joined forces with a used IBM dealer and led its equity placement area where he developed tax incentive programs for used IBM mainframe computers.

In 1980, Charlie started his own business in equipment leasing and thoroughly enjoyed being on his own, leasing everything from mainframe computers to airplanes and railroad cars.

Around 2010, Charlie decided to retire, but he quickly got bored and began a second career as a consultant in leasing and financial reporting. As of our 50th in 2018, he was still enjoying his job.

Those who kept in touch with him are aware of his hobby of writing gum-shoe noir detective novels which he self-published.

Charlie died suddenly on Thursday, July 29, 2021. He was 75 years old. He is survived by his beloved wife Bunny and his three children and grandchildren. His last residence was Commerce Twp., Michigan. Charlie's warm open smile, upbeat cheerfulness and dry wit will be missed by all who knew him

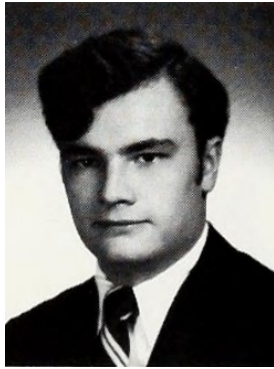

Jeff was quite a horseman. He could ride a horse as though he had been born on one. He loved to camp and ski and spent many happy years raising his children and enjoying his friends. Sadly, on March 28th, 2020, seven months before his 74th birthday, Jeff passed away from the Coronavirus.

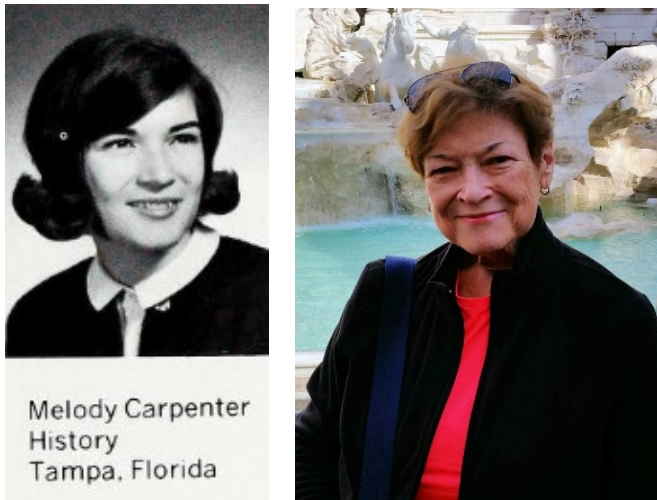
For his funeral, Jeff's children invited many of Jeff's friends to write stories about their dad to be placed in his obituary. Many spoke of Jeff as a great friend and father. They all seemed to agree that he had a big heart, a hearty laugh and a great sense of humor. One friend remembers Jeff as a person "larger than life" who always brought belly laughs and joy to every room, campfire, or ski lodge he inhabited. Another recalled, "Above all else, Jeff was sensitive and curious . . . about you, about your family, about everything going on in the world. "

In this obituary, classmate and fraternity brother, Chris Houghton, wrote half a dozen stories from their long friendship. He ended with the story about when Jeff visited Chris in Superior, Colorado. Without Chris knowing, Jeff had placed a slew of bumper stickers on his car. They were zany, hilarious and completely inappropriate for prime time viewing. Chris recalled that when he discovered them, he never laughed so hard before or since. Chris reports that these bumper stickers now live on the inside of his tool box. They still give him a chuckle each time he sees them. Chris remembers his friend as a legend and one of a kind. He will be missed.

Melody Carpenter was born in Toledo, Ohio. At Denison, she became a history major and a member of Alpha Phi.

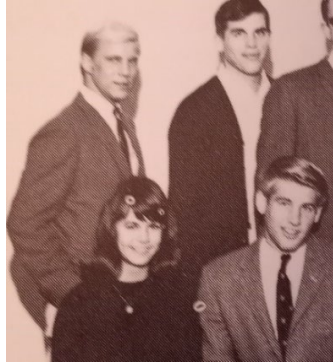
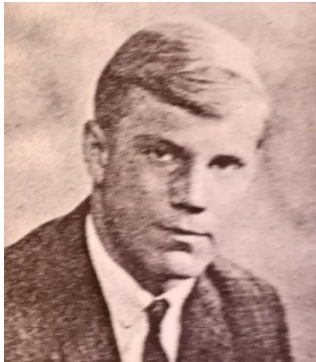

According to her own profile in our 50th Celebration book, she became a Claims Examiner, adjudicating veteran's applications for education, disability and death benefits. After their marriage, they moved to Washington D.C. and Melody, over time, worked her way up in the Veterans Administration. She served as the staff assistant to the Director of the Compensation and Pension Service. Here she wrote technical manuals and regulations, formulated budgets, helped develop content for computer programs, and worked with Congressional staffers on proposed legislation for veterans. She said she had the satisfaction of doing something for veterans and their families. Many of these were veterans of Vietnam and the early Middle East wars.

In retirement Melody conducted extensive research in genealogy. She loved history, reading, and traveling. More than anything, she enjoyed spending time with family and friends, all of whom greatly miss her. She passed away in Land O'Lakes, Florida on November 15, 2018.

Henry Coerdts was born September 10, 1946 and came to Denison from Shaker Heights, Ohio where he attended Hawken School, a day prep school in Cleveland. At Denison he majored in Chemistry and was a member of the Sigma Chi fraternity and the American Chemical Society.

According to Henry's 50th profile, he came back to the Sig house after graduating to find a letter tapped to the front hall mirror. It was a draft notice from LBJ. He spent all night commiserating with his Hawken buddies on the phone who were going to Denver to join the Army Reserves. Henry later found out he was out of luck because the Reserves had a two-year waiting list. So, in Denver he joined the U.S. Army and ended up at Fort Ord in California. He soon became a drill instructor. Henry stated that many of his recruits came from California jails, and one of them even shot him at a firing range. After two-years of active duty, he returned to Denver for reserve and summer camps. While in Denver, he attended the University of Denver where he graduated with MBA and CFA degrees.

Henry began his working career in Family Wealth and Portfolio Management with McDonald & Company and the Ameritrust Bank in Cleveland, Ohio. While at Ameritrust he met the love of his life, Barbara (Suni) Bartholomew, and they married in May of 1977 in Chagrin Falls. Henry continued his career and was fast tracked to a Senior Portfolio Management position at Key Bank where he had a successful 50-year career. He retired in 2017, but never stopped offering his knowledge and assistance to his friends and former clients as a consultant.

Henry was an avid outdoorsman. He was always found outside fishing, hiking or simply walking his dog. He enjoyed working in his yard, gardening and making maple syrup. He was a loving husband, loyal friend and co-worker, always able to make any situation positive.

Henry's greatest sense of pride came from his family. He treasured his marriage of 45 years to Suni as well as his son, daughter, and his one grandchild. Tom came to Denison from Pittsford Sutherland High School in the suburban town of Pittsford, eight miles southeast of Rochester, New York. At Denison he majored in history and became a member of the Sigma Chi fraternity where he was known as “Cooker.” Tom also played forward on the Denison Varsity Soccer team. In his own profile in our 50th Celebration Book, he said, “Often I could be found playing bridge in the student Union.” Classmate Jeff Gordon recalls joining Tom in bridge along with Jeff Whitman, Jake Jacobs, and Joe Owens.

After Denison, Tom wanted to go to law school but when he was drafted into the Army, he opted for the Marine Corps. He spent a year in Vietnam. Discharged in 1970, he attended Syracuse Law School and was admitted to the New York State Bar in 1974. He practiced law in his hometown of Pittsford for 43 years. In those years, he served four years as an assistant District Attorney and the rest as a lawyer a three-member private law firm.

In 1979, Tom was elected chairman of the Monroe County Conservative Party¹, a position he still held during our 50th. Politics was his passion and hobby. He published his party’s bi-annual newsletter and held its annual dinner. His efforts as chairman for 40 years had an incredible impact on the growth of his party and the composition of government in this part of the state of New York.

In 1986, he married his wife Maria Elena Esposito. They had no children but spent summers at their other residence on Canandaigua Lake boating and entertaining friends and family. They wintered in Venice, Florida. He and Maria also traveled extensively in the past few years before 2020.

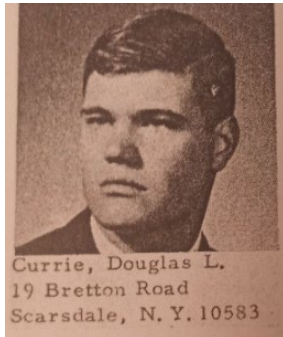
Tom died peacefully, Easter Sunday, April 12, 2020 at the age of 73. Tom is survived by his wife and best friend, Maria, and his brother.

Doug Currie was born in White Plains, N.Y. and survived a life threatening first year in childhood after suffering from nephrosis, a kidney issue. He grew up in Scarsdale, NY and then attended Darrow School in New Lebanon, NY. He was co-captain of the football team.

At Denison, Doug played football his freshman year, pledged Beta Theta Pi and became an art major. During his junior year he was THE driving force to form a Rugby team at Denison. The DU Rugby club has continued to be strong ever since. It flourishes today with both a women's team and men's team that play fall and spring schedules.

After his Junior year, Doug attended at CASA (College Art Study Abroad) in Paris as part of his art major. In his senior year, Doug took off the first semester for travel. It was then that he suffered a tragic auto accident in New Mexico that left him severely disabled. His long and arduous recovery prevented him from returning to DU to graduate with his class. Through much hard work and determination, Doug eventually continued his art studies and graduated with a Bachelor's of Fine Arts with the School of visual Arts in New York City in 1976. For many years he assisted Earl Mahon an instructor of art at the Art Students League.

Six years before he died, Doug moved to Delray Florida where was in good health until March of 2021 when with low blood oxygen and low pulse he died of a cardiac arrest the morning of July 23, 2021.

His family obituary, said, "Doug was a fine caring man, generously kind and never short of an enthusiastic humorous observation. His art was his salvation. The surprise of his passing is only matched by his graceful and fearless mastery of some tough circumstances".

His junior year roommate Dan Kreer recently wrote that Doug's courage, focus, and persistence has made him truly inspirational to all who knew him. Dan further reported that in the fall of 2021, in the midst of Covid, twelve Betas and former ruggers came back to Denison for a memorial event for Doug. At that time, the group established and endowed "The Doug Currie Most Inspirational Player Award" for the men's Rugby team. The award includes a perpetual trophy in the Athletic Department and a plaque given to each year's winner". When the award was announced to family, friends, players, and fans at the DU-Kenyon rugby game, there wasn't a dry eye in the crowd.

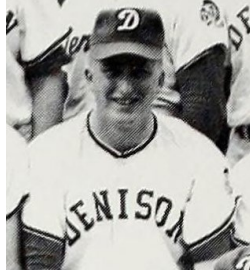

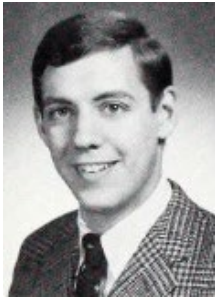
When she retired, she continued her commitment to serve the most vulnerable by working with at-risk babies and children with speech and language rehabilitation.

At Denison Jeff was perhaps most famous for his co-founding of “The Cave” in the basement of Talbot Hall with Dan Int-Hout of the class of '67. You may recall it was a late-night coffee house, where for 50 cents, you could come and hear folk music when this genre made its second revival in the early 60's. John Denver resided in Columbus at the time while John's father was a Colonel at the Lockbourne Air Force Base. John was 21 years-old and Jeff befriended him and had him come out to Granville on his motorcycle to sing on campus. Jeff even fixed John up with some Denison co-eds. Later, Jeff created a bigger and better place at the Colwell House. This time it had running water and a bathroom. It was called the “Bandersnatch,” and its chill vibe can still be experienced today in the basement of Huffman Hall.

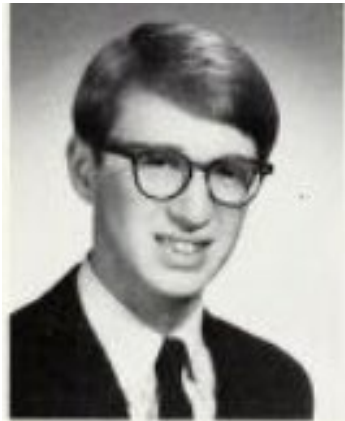
From 1968-1972, Jeff earned the rank of captain in the U.S. Air Force and served in Administration & Protocol in both California and Iceland. From 1972-75 Jeffrey then earned his Master's in Public Administration at Cal State, Hayward, while also attending the Insurance Institute of America.

Jeff clearly made a name for himself in the Insurance field. By the time he retired, he had become known as a well-known expert in risk management and workers' compensation and served in many of the industry's executive leadership positions. Jeffery was honored as “Risk Manager of the Year” by Business Insurance Magazine in 1989 and was the standing Chairman of the Business Insurance National Workers' Compensation & Disability Conference for nine years. Starting in the 1990's, Jeffery became a popular writer, industry spokesperson, ARM instructor, entrepreneur and educator at insurance doctorate programs, and a sought-after speaker at his industry's conferences. William Savacool Saunders, known by most as Bill, was born in Mamaroneck, NY and graduated from Northfield Mount Hermon School. He came to Denison from Amherst, Massachusetts. Bill's interest in poetry was apparent at Denison where he majored in English and was, according to a classmate and fellow English major, always the most brilliant student in the class. He was active in Denison's concert choir.

After Denison, he went on to University of Iowa where he received a PhD in Literary Criticism and Contemporary British Poetry. His later career was at The Harvard Graduate School of Design for 30 years where he was the founding editor of The Harvard Design Magazine and edited books on urban and landscape architecture. He spoke widely about these subjects at both personal and professional events. He was also a scholar and writer on contemporary American poetry.

Bill was also a devotee of jazz, classical, gospel and soul music. In later years, he was also a rock and jazz drummer and a vocalist in doo-wop groups; he loved to organize gatherings of dancing and music. He also served as president of The Auburndale Community Association, was a member of the First Unitarian Universalist Society of Newton, and engaged in committed political activism.

Bill died on September 12, 2018 in Auburndale, MA of a fall in his home. He had a very accomplished life. Bill will be remembered as a brilliant thinker, reader, writer, and conversationalist, and as a husband, father, grandfather, brother, friend, and colleague whose creative mind was an endless, unique source of knowledge and joy. 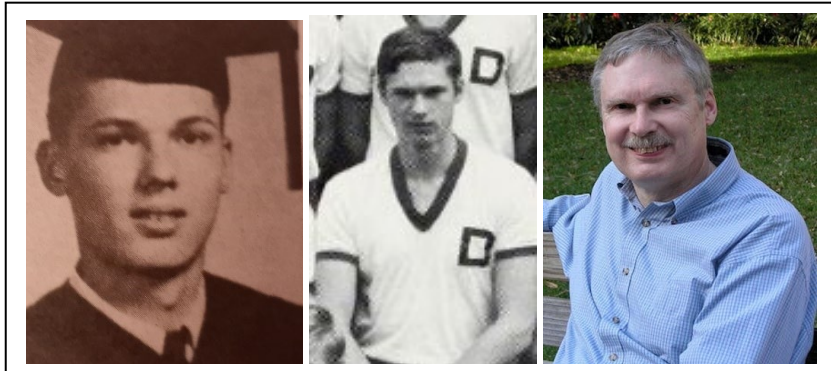

John was born on October 1, 1946, in Philadelphia. At Denison John pledged Lambda Chi and majored in Chemistry. He was a valuable varsity athlete in both soccer and lacrosse.

After graduating from Denison University, John met and married Linda Ellison and then spent several years as a navigator in the U.S. Air Force, including a tour in Vietnam.



Having earned a Ph.D. in urban and regional economics from the University of Delaware, John began a long career as a researcher and professor in economics and public policy. In his home state of Delaware, John became a well-known economist and a published author and frequent Op-Ed contributor to newspapers

across the state. He directed research and served on many boards.¹ He is the author of over one hundred applied research monographs, as well as the book *Bears, Bulls, and Golden Calves: Applying Christian Ethics in Economics*.

During his life, John was active in the ministries of several area churches and was a board member of the Nehemiah Gateway CDC, and other Christian and youth organizations, as well as a founding member of the board of the Caesar Rodney Institute.²

John was a devoted sports fan and continued to be involved with athletics. He played and then coached lacrosse at all levels, including St. Marks High School in Wilmington. He loved reading, especially the Bible, theology and history, and he enjoyed singing and playing the piano and eating any desserts he could find. But most of all, he loved people: talking to them, getting to know them, encouraging them, making them laugh, and finding ways to help them in any way that he could. A fellow Delawarean professional said this about John, “He was my favorite economist with a heart... John was always about helping the underserved. He did that through his work as an economist. He lived life that way by working with his church and a few organizations in the city of Wilmington that help individuals who had come across hard times. He had a big heart.” He is survived by his wife of 51 years, Linda Stapleford and his daughter and son.

In Peru, she became a personal finance officer with Banco de Crédito del Peru. From 1981 to 1995, she had the opportunity to travel throughout Latin America.

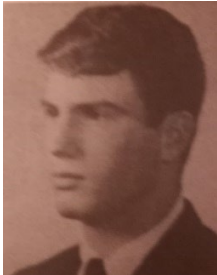

Virginia is survived by her husband Harry, her daughter Heather and her brother.

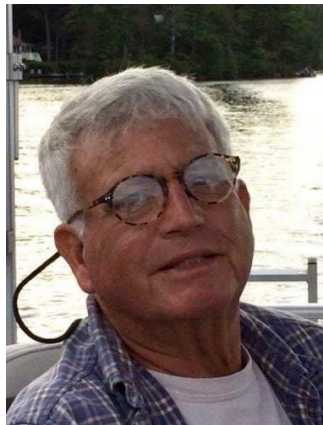
